

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
AYAP

I felt who Am I to start advising and lecturing people to cope with teenhood when I am exposed to the perils of the moral vices surrounding us, and I am yet to overcome it too. And somewhere in my head, a voice kept telling me "I was too young".

MIM is set to be a global platform that helps the younger generation deal with the challenges they face in various aspects of their lives and have the desire to learn and excel in both worlds.







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
